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ACADEMIC YEAR 2016-2017

Introduction

Marian College Kuttikkanam acquired its long cherished goal of academic autonomy on June 1, 2016. The students who joined the College in the academic year 2016 became part of the autonomous stream and the rest of the students continued to be under the academic administration of the parent University, Mahatma Gandhi University, Kottayam.

Anticipating the declaration of autonomy status the College established an office for the conduct of examinations. Mr Biju P Mani, Associate Professor, Department of Law, and Dr Soosy Joseph, Associate Professor, Department of Hindi, were appointed as the Controller of Examination and Additional Controller of Examinations respectively immediately after acquiring the autonomy status. Ms Amruth K John joined the office as the system administrator and Mr Bobby K Mani served as the Camp Officer to facilitate the valuation of answer books. The administrative team comprised of Sr Sonykutty Varghese, Mr John K.S and Mr Manoj Thomas.

The first task of the office was the preparation of the Manual of Examinations. The Manual was prepared based on inputs gathered from extensive discussions with the teaching, administrative and management personnel of the College and was approved by the Academic Council and the Governing Council of the College. It was submitted to the University as provided under the Mahatma Gandhi University Act.

The Manual is broadly based on the Examination Manual of Mahatma Gandhi University, as required by the Mahatma Gandhi University Act. However, there are certain areas where the College has the discretion to make its own provisions and those areas of autonomy are made use of by the College to enrich the quality of programmes offered under the autonomy stream. The highlights of the manual of Marian College are the following;





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- The proportion of marks between the Semester End Examination (SEE) and Continuous Assessment (CA) for taught courses was prescribed as 60:40. Under the University system it was 80:20 for most of the programmes. The objective behind providing relatively high weightage for Continuous Assessment is to avoid excessive weightage for Semester End Examinations which would promote an undesirable tendency among students for mugging up academic contents towards the end of the academic semester.
- The Manual provided to explore the possibility of developing a question bank for each course and to generate question papers based on the question bank. This was also a novel attempt in the context of autonomous colleges in Kerala. The traditional model for preparation of question papers for semester end exams relied on external faculty as question papers setters appointed by the Controller of Examinations. The downside of the model was the likelihood of disjunction between the teaching and assessment process.
- The Manual of the College decided to fix the components of the Continuous Assessment taking into consideration the relatively high weightage of the CA component in the assessment process. It was agreed that for all taught courses there should be three examinations namely CA1, CA2 and CA3. Five marks was awarded for attendance and two other components were Continuous Assessment for Deepening Learning (CADL) and Continuous Assessment for Research Skills (CARS). Though the components and weightage were fixed by the Manual, the faculty was given the freedom to choose the activities for the components based on approval by the respective faculty council of the department concerned.
- The College also decided to hold the valuation of answer scripts in valuation camps held in the campus and to avoid home valuation. It was also decided that there should be faculty from outside the College in each of the Board of Valuation.







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Academic/Examination Calendar

One of the first task of the Office of the Controller of Examination (CoE) was to prepare an academic/examination calendar. The first semester examinations were proposed to be held in the month of November and the Second Semester in the month of March. The academic calendar for the year 2016-17 is given below.

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Grievances from Students

During this academic year no grievances were received regarding the conduct of examinations.

Automation initiatives

- A team of faculty members developed a software for generating question papers for the Semester End Examinations. The software was named as SmartE. Question papers were generated using the software right from the first examination itself.
- The College successfully developed and implemented a software for the collection of fees and registration of examinations during this year for the first examination (November 2016) itself. The software was integrated with the website of the College and students could log in and make payments of examination fees online.
- The result processing of the examinations conducted during this year was done by a proprietary software named Rovan. The Rovan team customized the product to suit the requirements of the College. The software was hosted in intranet using a server which was located in the Office of the Controller of Examinations to ensure maximum security for the data.
- Moodle LMS was customized by the faculty of the College and was made use of for the purpose of the conduct of various continuous assessment examinations. Students were asked to upload their assignments into the LMS and the CA scores were published by the teachers in the LMS.
